Spring Romp in Selma





Dear Walking,


Yes, children can be quite overwhelming and I understand that they are not all educated about how to approach you in a dignified way. BUT, you absolutely don't want to give up your walks do you?




(Btw, our official house rule is "no dogs on the furniture" but, exceptions are made from time to time.)

Thanks to all those at GRR, we have a wonderful, happy, and well-adjusted member of the family. It has been eight weeks since he arrived. I share this update, because all of you that work so hard to locate, transport, rehabilitate, foster, and adopt these dogs should know how well this can work out – for everyone!

We have renamed him, "Rusty P. Tucker", or "Rusty". Rusty stands for our Rusty-Allen Airport (he's an airport dog now). We picked Tucker after a favorite airshow pilot. P? Well, we can't tell you what that's for!

He's an energetic and happy dog. His tail is either wagging, or he's prancing around the yard with his tail up in the air as if to fly a flag and show "who's #1."

He has a good routine:

- Around 7:00 every morning, he's the "alarm clock." He has many methods, a wet nose, maybe a "woof", but more likely a couple paws up on the bed and hot dog breath saying: "C'mon, get up...l'm ready to go!!"
- Then, he makes a lap of the back yard, does his business, and it's time for BREAKFAST!
- And last, he will sit, stay-and-hold while we fill his bowl. He eats only after we release him with "OK, Good-boy." He eats much slower than he did originally, it was not really a big problem, but it continues to get better.

He's got quite a pet-vocabulary now: Sit, Stay, (lay) Down, Speak (its a gentle "woof"), and other situational vocabulary like "go outside", "you hungry?", "let's go for a walk". He gets it now and it's awesome.

He'll load in the car eagerly - that's new - he didn't like the car at first. He's starting to ride up on the seat, and not the floor, but is still a bit tentative. We have not gone flying in the plane with him yet - it will be a few more weeks until we travel with him in that mode.

We've socialized him with a few other dogs and all the results have been good - both at home and away. He loves to play/wrestle - we're working on making sure that behavior is focused on visiting dogs and not visiting humans! He's visited many of our friend's homes and is very well behaved.

He spends a good amount of the day with me in my home office and moves his dog bed around the house to "set up" wherever we are! He's a hoot - all that puppy energy and mischievousness, but he's really learning well how to communicate and engage us in a positive way. He's learning "fetch". This was not an automatic thing for this guy. He's quite proud of himself when he's responding to commands and engaging his humans.

He still likes to roam occasionally, if we let him off-leash outside the yard, but he's not an escape artist. He is happy to hang out inside or outside and not destructive if left for several hours alone.

He loves the pool - pool water must taste great -- but you know, you can't drink pool water unless you're standing on the step with all fours knee-deep. Mom really loves it when you go back inside with wet feet to help clean the floor. (not!)

We're one happy family. Rusty is "living the dream", and, so are we!

Volunteer Spotlight - David and Lisa Savage

Tell us a little about you and your dogs.

Our involvement with GRR is currently fostering Diesel, although I swore off of fostering after we adopted Goldie! Being a foster failure, we decided to switch to respite care instead. We like respite care because it is time-limited, and I like to put "fresh eyes" on our respite guests' needs and help out a foster family. I tend to get attached very quickly. I was on the transport team in the past, and even a short transport would have me hooked. My husband and I have transported a couple of dogs from more distant locations in his plane, as he is a private pilot. I am also on the phone interview team.

How long have you been volunteering with GRR?

My husband and I are both physicians in private practice. I can't remember when we joined GRR, but it was at least 15 years ago. I remember joining after I got a forwarded email appealing to the community for more volunteers. We had a fancy Golden named Grady who was our "first child", and I wanted to meet people with a love for golden retrievers in common.

What is your favorite part above all?

My favorite part: getting an email that says a phone interviewee I talked to has been successfully matched with a new family member. I also enjoy the GRR social activities and getting to meet people from different walks of life with a shared interest.

Describe a cute/funny/interesting story while volunteering in this position.

I did respite care on a regular basis for a permanent foster named Homer. Homer was an old guy with cataracts but his nose worked really well. One day when venturing out for a walk, he stuck his whole head into our hedges and came out with a live, flapping big bird in his mouth! We were very surprised at the commotion and at old Homer's hunting skill! The bird was dropped and flew away, so it ended well for all.

Give one piece of advice for those interested in serving as volunteers.

Even if your time is very limited, there are ways to contribute. For example, I am assigned a phone

interview about once a month, and it takes less than an hour total. So many of us have full time jobs, kids and other commitments, and with GRR, you can pick and choose what you are able to do and help out even if you have little free time.

What are one or two words that describe your experience while volunteering with GRR?

Two words that describe my experience volunteering with GRR are "fulfilling" and "community". The GRR group is full of such wonderful people, all committed to canine welfare. While golden retrievers are our focus, it's not unheard of for a golden-hearted dog like Diesel to be taken in as well. We are grateful for our involvement with the dogs and people of GRR!

Featuring the Benson/Goldberg Pack



From Michelle Goldberg and Bob Benson:

How many dogs allow you to live with them and what are their names? We have 4 GRR dogs and one cat:

- Sedona 7.5 years old
- Durango 6.5 years old
- Juneau 5 years old
- Kona 4 years old
- Frisco, the feline 13 years old

Describe feeding time.

This is a pretty easy process for us. They all know where their food bowl goes. Once the bowls are just about ready to be set down they will go to their spot and wait patiently.

When they get treats, they all know to sit and wait their turn, although Sedona tries to act like all of the treats should be for him. Juneau is the one who decides when its treat time, by scratching on the pantry door. If that doesn't work he will use his verbal commands on us!

What does your welcome home committee look like? Getting tackled by a football team? The welcome home committee in our house is pretty much the same whether we've gone to check the mail or been gone all day. It is usually a full on tackle with Juneau leading the cheering section. They will all try to squeeze into the very small area by the garage door and it can become quite chaotic. Now, we just open up the door and stand back.

What happens when you want to take a vacation?

This is a two-part question. If we are taking the dogs with us, it will take me a while to pack their stuff. "They" have a dog car specifically for hauling them around and it is perfect for road trips. We've taken all of the back seats out of our Toyota Sequoia and put a large rubber mat over the carpet. Packing for 4 dogs is definitely an adventure. It includes, bowls, food, medicines, toys, lots of tennis balls, grooming supplies, towels, old sheets and blankets and plenty of treats. They all LOVE going in the car so it's a lot of fun for them.

If the dogs do not get to go on a vacation with us, sad but true, then we plan our trips around our pet sitters, who stay at the house. I have a full page instruction manual (usually front and back) for each animal. My pet sitters know I expect daily updates and pictures!

Do you block a day at the vet and do check ups for 4? Is there a large pack discount? Does your vet love you a lot?

I have the dogs on a schedule where Juneau and Sedona go together and Kona and Durango go together, so that I am not having to take them all at one time. We get no discounts for having so many dogs at our vet, but I love my vet so much that I would go to her for my own medical needs if I could.

Does your housekeeper come weekly? What are some of your favorite cleaning products for the several Chihuahuas of dog hair shed daily?

I wish! She only comes every other week and I swear to her that I do vacuum regularly, really I do! We have a Dyson Animal, a Roomba and a Swiffer stick vacuum. There are lint brushes all over the house and cars. All of our animals are allowed on all furniture and beds so it is a constant job to keep things clean. Our house and yard usually look like we run a daycare. I haven't had any luck teaching the dogs to pick up their toys.

How do you take everybody for a walk?

The hardest part usually is the act of getting them ready. All of their leashes and collars hang on a rack inside the garage and they know exactly where to go when its "time". Juneau needs be leashed up first or he gets completely wild. If one of us is walking them solo, then getting out the door is sometimes like a mini-circus and a juggling act.

Juneau and Sedona hate to be in the middle. Durango and Kona both pull to the left. If Sedona ends up getting stuck in the middle along the way he has been known to just stop mid walk and has almost tripped us a few times. It takes about 5 minutes of walking before they all get into their groove, and then it's smooth sailing...until we have to turn a corner or they see a cat or a squirrel. Then we start the jockeying for position all over again.

If you have two hands and 4 Golden Retrievers, how do you handle all of the nuzzling and competition for loves and petting?

Oh trust me, they manage to get their share of attention. Even the cat gets in on the love fests. They aren't at all afraid to wiggle their way in between each other. I will say though, that in our house, the squeaky wheel definitely gets the grease (or the petting) and in case you couldn't guess who the squeaky wheel is...Juneau wins the title.

How many pounds of scared dog are crawling up on your lap during thunderstorms and fireworks? Kona is the one most affected by this. She gets very nervous and will like to lay as close to you as

possible, but she also likes to go in the closet and hang out there. Durango gets a little nervous and likes to be in the dark hall or in his bed facing the wall. Juneau and Sedona are not phased at all. In general this is not a big deal at our house.

Does an unfamiliar being more than two inches long ever approach within 20 feet without you knowing about it?

A leaf hardly has a chance to fall without us knowing about it. It would definitely be very difficult for someone to sneak up on us with this pack. Juneau is the guard dog in the bunch. He has a very good 6th sense and he can be very protective. The other three, in typical GR fashion, think that everyone exists for their benefit and must want to see, pet and talk to them.

From a GRR Facebook post


- I cannot walk away from a running bath or tub of water with Jilly nearby. Wet things happen.

If disaster strikes, do you have a plan in place to keep your pets safe? About 35 percent of cat and dog owners do not, according to a survey commissioned by The American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (ASPCA).

Unfortunately, if you wait until an emergency occurs to think about a plan, it's probably going to be too late. Taking action now to put a simple plan in place can make the difference between life and death for your pets. Tim Rickey, senior director of ASPCA Field Investigations and Response, explained:



"It doesn't matter where you live, anyone can be hit with a natural or man-made disaster ... When you're in the moment, it can be

very stressful for you and your pets ... Having a plan in place ahead of time can save you precious time and energy, so you can focus on quickly getting you and your pets to safety."

6 Disaster Preparedness Tips

In the event of emergency, having the following plans in place will be priceless.

- 1. Prepare a Pet Emergency Kit
- 2. Update Your Pet's Identification
- 3. Know Where You'll Go
- 4. Have a Back-up Plan That Involves Your Pet-Friendly Neighbors
- 5. Use a Rescue Alert Sticker
- 6. Keep a Photo of Your Pet Handy

Dear Human of Mine:

As the dog of the house, I want to take this opportunity to point out the five behaviors of yours that scare me. I hope you take no offense (and please keep the food comin').

have one man husband, two girl children and one boy dog, it seems to me that I would be the only "good boy" in this family. I sit in front of you and wag my tail every time you look at me and ask this question. Every time. Every day. I would think after all of these months you might learn who the "good boy" was in this family and remember it. Maybe some day. I will continue to remind you with the fruitless tail-wagging but I'm not optimistic. It's not a rhetorical question. I am the good boy. It's me.

Another question you endlessly ask is, "Who wants dinner?" It might be easier to ask who doesn't want dinner as no one would answer and then you'd have your answer. I always want dinner. I want it now. I wanted it five minutes ago. I wanted it five hours ago. And I will want it immediately after I eat it. I always want dinner. So no need to keep asking. Just serve it up whenever you have a spare moment. Like now. How about now? Someday you



may remember that it is always me who wants dinner. But I guess I'll have to wait until it occurs to you that some good boy in this house might like dinner any old time and thank you for asking who that might be. It is me. Me. Me.

Similarly, your inability to remember the answer to your daily question about who is the cutest dog ever gives me cause for concern. Although I have apparently been deemed the cutest dog ever by you on most days, I really don't need to be a superlative. I'm into the food more than the compliments. Just keep the food comin' my way and I'll be happy to be the runner-up.

This next one really makes me laugh! "Who is always on the wrong side of the door?" Like you really don't know that after I go outside I will eventually want to come back inside? You should really try to focus a bit more. I go out. I come in. Especially when it may be time for dinner. Remember who wants dinner? The good boy. Me. That's who.

"Who loves you?" That question you often ask usually precedes a handout of something yummy so I don't mind hearing that question at all. Ever. And I could answer that question in a heartbeat if I could speak the King's English but I know you love me because I am the good boy, the cutest dog ever, who happens to find himself on the wrong side of the door on a regular basis. That's right. Me. The one who wants dinner! Is it dinnertime?

2015 GRR Tax Deductions



The IRS allows you to claim the following deductions as charitable contributions, if you itemize:

- Mileage for every mile you travel for GRR purposes: vet appointments, transport, home visits, etc.
- **Direct** expenses such as food, medical supplies and other items for a foster dog.
- Money spent on envelopes, postage, containers for supplies, baggies for supplies, etc.

GRR always recommends that you talk with your tax consultant/adviser on all deductions. Publication 526 can be found <u>here</u> for more information. For contributions less than \$250, you should retain your own records to substantiate the deduction. For individual (not aggregated) expenses above \$250, please request a letter of acknowledgement from Tim Tierney, GRR Treasurer. If you need donation receipts for contributions over \$250, contact <u>Tim Tierney</u>, GRR Treasurer.
